Welcome!

This is the first in a series of periodic newsletters about the national ML3 initiative: *Librarians as Leaders for Media Literacy*. While some of you have already been involved in ML3 in New York State, others may know very little about the history of ML3.

ML3 was born in the summer of 2021 when Project Look Sharp ([PLS](#)), received a 2-year grant from the Booth Ferris Foundation - in partnership with the New York State Library Association ([SLSA](#)) - to enable the integration of critical thinking and media literacy in schools across New York State through the leadership of K-12 public school librarians. Constructivist Media Decoding: (CMD)

ML3 promotes the CMD model of inquiry-based, student-centered, curriculum-driven media analysis pioneered by Project Look Sharp over the last 30 years. Our very successful 2-year initiative (thank you SLSA) enabled our "original 19" ML3 librarians, together with hundreds of other school librarians across the state, to advise and collaborate with PLS to develop the ML3 model. In August of 2023 PLS, in partnership with the American Association of School Librarians ([AASL](#)) and in collaboration with the National Association for Media





in collaboration with the National Association for Media Literacy Education ([NAMLE](#)), received a 2 year planning grant from the federal Institute for Museum and Library Services ([IMLS](#)) to develop a plan for scaling our ML3 work across the nation.

Online CMD Course for School Librarians:

Based on feedback from the NYS ML3 initiative, Project Look Sharp's Executive Director, Cyndy Scheibe, led the creation of a new online course that gives school librarians the inspiration, knowledge, resources, and practice to integrate constructivist media decoding into their work with students and/or teachers.

The 15 hour course includes 4 self-paced modules with engaging activities, videos, readings, and reflections. The course begins and includes the crafting of individual activity plans, sharing with and responding to peers, and individual coaching and office hours.

We ran the *Online CMD* course as a pilot in the summer of 2023 - to rave reviews.

CMD has changed the way that I approach teaching media with students. Having the option to do it virtually made it possible for me.

In response to this success we piloted three other sections of the course in the spring 2024; one for school librarians across New York State, a second course for participants in Washington State, and a third course for school librarians in 24 other states. The response to these courses has been overwhelmingly positive, reinforcing our plan to offer the Online CMD Course across the country through state school library organizations.

Hybrid CMD Course for Teachers Facilitated by a Trained ML3 School Librarian:

This fall through winter we also piloted a version of the Online CMD Course taught by ML3 school librarian, Bridget Crossman, which she led with 8 teachers in her Lake George, NY school district. In

addition to the 4 self-paced modules, the Hybrid version included 4 face-to-face sessions where each teacher led a brief "practice decoding" with debriefing facilitate by Bridget. As you can see from the following quotes from participating teachers - the course was a success.

This approach fosters critical thinking and promotes deeper understanding. Students are constantly asked to navigate a complex world filled with media; in short this will be some of the most important work we do with students. Kaylee S. – MS English Teacher


